

Adonis, Marios, Associate Professor in Clinical Health Psychology, Head of the Department of Social Sciences, University of Nicosia. Dr Adonis is a board member of the Cyprus Mental Health Commission and of the Disciplinary Committee of the Cyprus Psychologists' Registration Council. He has served two terms on the executive council of the Cyprus AntiDrug Council, a term as the National Delegate for the Republic of Cyprus at the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, and was the Substitute Member at the Management Board of the European Monitoring Center for Drugs and Drug Addiction for five years. Dr Adonis has also served as the vice president of the Cyprus Psychologists Association for two terms, served a term on the board of the Cyprus Psychologists Registration Council, and represented Cyprus in the Standing Committee on Ethics of the European Federation of Psychological Associations for two terms. He also works as a Clinician and is the Clinical supervisor for a substance dependence rehabilitation center in Cyprus. His research interests include psychosocial and cultural factors in cardiovascular, physical, and mental health, positive psychology, stress, and trauma.

Alexandrou, Haralambos, Special Scientist, Department of History and Archaeology, University of Cyprus. Dr Alexandrou holds a Bachelor's degree in History and Archaeology form Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, a Master's degree in Historical Research from the University of Nottingham, and a PhD in Modern and Contemporary History from the University of Cyprus. Among others, he has edited and published three volumes with sources on the EOKA Struggle and is the author of three monographs on the military aspect of the Turkish invasion in 1974. He is President of the EOKA Liberation Struggle Foundation (IΔAAE), President of the Cyprus Oral History Association (ΕΠΙΚΥ), member of the Cyprus Committee of Military History (ΚΕΣΙ), and member of the Council of the Historical Memory of EOKA Struggle (ΣΙΜΑΕ).

Christofi, Andreas, PhD Candidate, University of Cyprus. Andreas Christofi was born in Nicosia and comes from Agridia and Zodia. He holds a degree in History and Archeology and a master's degree in Modern and Contemporary History from the University of Cyprus. He is currently preparing a doctoral thesis on the Cypriot union movement and the ethnic role of the Church of Cyprus during British colonial rule, at the same University. He has worked on several research projects and his scientific interests focus on Modern Greek History with an emphasis on the History of the Cypriot union movement. Faustmann, Hubert, Professor of History and International Relations, Department of Politics and Governance, University of Nicosia. Professor Hubert Faustmann obtained his PhD in History from the University of Mannheim (1999). He is currently a Professor of History and International Relations at the University of Nicosia, where he has worked since 1999. Additionally, he is the director of the Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung Cyprus office since May 2011. He was the editor in chief of the refereed journal The Cyprus Review from 2006 until 2016. He co-writes the annual reports about Cyprus for the Political Data Yearbook of the European Journal of Political Research. He is also editor and one of the authors of the monthly FES Cyprus Newsletter. Professor Faustmann is an expert on British colonial Cyprus and post-independence Cypriot history and politics. His research also focuses on hydrocarbon politics in the Eastern Mediterranean as well as the relationship between state and society where he focuses on Clientelism and Political Patronage. He is the author of Divide and Quit? British Colonial Policy in Cyprus 1878-1960, (MATEO (eBook), 1999) and is the editor/co-editor of several volumes, including: The Role of Education in Multicultural Cyprus (Cambridge Scholars Publishing, 2017); An Island in Europe: The EU and the Transformation of Cyprus (I.B. Tauris, 2011); Reunifying Cyprus: The Annan Plan and Beyond (I.B. Tauris, 2009); The Government and Politics of Cyprus, (Peter Lang, 2008); Britain in Cyprus: Colonialism and Post-Colonialism 1878-2006, (Bibliopolis, 2006). He has published numerous book chapters and peer-reviewed articles.

**Hajisoteriou, Christina**, Associate Professor, Department of Education, School of Education, University of Nicosia. Dr. Christina Hajisoteriou is an Associate Professor in Intercultural Education at the University of Nicosia. She was awarded a first-class honours BA in Primary Education (best graduate of the year) by the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens. She received annual curriculum awards by the Greek Foundation of National Scholarships. In 2006, she received her MPhil (Thesis Grade A) in Educational Research from the University of Cambridge.
