

**Ioanna Alexandrou** is a historian and philologist specialising in the Modern and Contemporary History of Cyprus, with a focus on the enclaved Maronites and Greek Cypriots, displacement, the role of women in sociopolitical affairs, education, and oral history. She is currently pursuing her PhD at the Department of History and Archaeology of the University of Cyprus, examining the social, demographic, and cultural dimensions of the enclavement phenomenon. She has presented and published her research in Cyprus and internationally, combining archival research, oral testimonies, and ethnographic approaches to preserve and highlight the historical memory of Cyprus.

George Camelaris, born in 1938, is a holder of an MSc degree (with Distinction) in Agricultural Economics and Rural Development.
